

ANIMATION SEQUENCE



- 1. WebMD Symptom Checker logo fades in
- 2. Progress bar arrow lengthens in width; green underline moves to SYMPTOMS
- 3. What are your symptoms are fades in
- **4.** Common Symptoms area fades in 1 symptom at a time
- 5. My Symptoms area fades in
- 6. Previous/Continue Button fades in

After the first symptom is added:


- 7. First symptom fades in
- 8. Meter fades in / gauge animates
- **9.** 'Try adding" message slides from top (behind "My Symptoms" area if Symptom Checker Findings = WEAK
- 4. Common Symptoms is replaced with Related Symptoms (fades in one at a time)
- 10. Continue buton becomes active

NOTES



- **A.** When match strength changes, description also changes
- **B.** Message fades out once user adds another symptom
- C. 2nd (and succeeding) symptom slides in from the left
- D. arrow appears when symptoms are peeking on the right. My Symptoms should always be in one line. Same with My Medications and Current Conditions. Arrows are visible when needed.




- Elements load / animate squentially

When the user clicks on the CONTINUE button from the HISTORY page, this loading page fades in


Dots resize one after another



- OnHover message fades in in relation to the condition match strength




